

A Brief Analysis

INTRODUCTION

The Tenth Session of the Seventeenth Lok Sabha commenced on 07 December 2022 and concluded on 23 December 2022. During the Session, Lok Sabha fulfilled its constitutionally mandated responsibilities and transacted important Financial, Legislative and other Business for over 68 hours and 51 minutes spread across 13 sittings. The Ninth Session of the Seventeenth Lok Sabha, saw elections to the Office of President of India and election to the Office of Vice-President of India. Shrimati Droupadi Murmu was declared elected as the President of India and Shri Jagdeep Dhankhar was declared elected to the Office of Vice President of India.

During the Tenth Session Lok Sabha record an overall business productivity of 97 per cent.

Seating arrangements for the Members in the Lok Sabha Chamber and its Galleries adopted in earlier Sessions were discontinued, in view of the improving COVID situation, and the sittings during the Tenth Session were held in the Lok Sabha Chamber. Members occupied seats in the Lok Sabha Chamber as per Division/Seat Numbers allotted to them.

India's G20 Presidency

On the opening day of the Session, on 7 December 2022, on behalf of the House, Lok Sabha Speaker, Shri Om Birla, congratulated the Union Government and the people of India, on India's assumption of the G20 Presidency since 1 December, 2022. Shri Birla said that such a major global responsibility during *Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav* was a matter of pride for the nation. He welcomed the fact that besides the G20 Heads of State Summit, the Presiding Officers of the Parliaments of G20 countries would also meet under the leadership of the Parliament of India, during the G20 Parliamentary Speakers' Summit (P20) in 2023.



SITTINGS OF THE HOUSE


During the Session, 13 Sittings were held. The First Session of the 17th Lok Sabha had 37 sittings whereas the Second and Third Sessions had 20 and 23 sittings, respectively. Lok Sabha sat for 10 sittings in the Fourth Session, the Fifth Session saw 24 sittings and in the sixth, Seventh Sessions and Eighth Session the numbers of sittings were 17, 18 and 27 respectively. The Ninth Session saw 16 Sittings.



SITTING HOURS

The Tenth Session of the 17th Lok Sabha sat for 68 hours and 51 minutes. During the First Session, the House sat for 280 hours whereas during the Second Session, the sitting hour was 130 hours and 45 minutes. Lok Sabha sat for 110 hours and 15 minutes in the Third Session. During the Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Sessions, the House recorded sitting time of 60 hours, 131 hours 56 minutes, 21 hours 21

minutes and 83 hours 20 minutes, respectively. The Eighth Session sat for 177 Hours and 52 minutes, whereas the Ninth Session saw sitting Hours of 44 Hours and 38 minutes.




DISRUPTIONS AND TIME LOST


The Tenth Session witnessed few disruptions of House proceedings leading to the adjournment of the House. A total of 02 hours 26 minutes of time earmarked was lost due to disruptions.

The House lost 77 hours 48 minutes and 18 hours 48 minutes during the Sixth and Seventh Sessions, respectively. During the First Session of the 17th Lok Sabha, there was no loss of time at all. The Second and Third Sessions lost 6 hours 31 minutes and 30 hours 15 minutes, respectively, to disruptions. A total of 3 hours 3 minutes time was lost to disruptions during the Fourth Session of the 17th Lok

Sabha. During the fifth Session 31 hours and 55 minutes were lost to disruptions. The Sixth Session saw 77 hours and 48 minutes lost to disruption, whereas the Seventh and Eighth Session saw 18 hours and 48 minutes and 02 hours and 49 minutes lost to disruptions respectively. The Ninth Session saw 53 hours and 41 minutes lost to disruption.

Lok Sabha sat 3 hours 07 minutes beyond the normal Business hours, during the 10th Session, to complete listed Business. During the First Session of the 17th Lok Sabha, House sat 73 hours 14 minutes beyond normal working hours whereas in the Second Session, House 28 hours 43 minutes to complete listed Business. During the Third and Fourth Sessions, Lok Sabha sat 21 hours 48 minutes and 23 hours, respectively, beyond normal sitting hours. Fifth Session recorded 48 hours 23 minutes additional Business hours in Lok Sabha. The Sixth and Seventh Sessions saw the House sit for 2 hours 12 minutes and 18 hours 11 minutes beyond the regular working hours. During the Eighth Session, the House sat late for 40 hours to complete listed business. During the Ninth Session the House sat late for 4 hours and 43 minutes to complete listed business.



BILLS INTRODUCED AND PASSED

The House recorded a productive session with regard to bills passed. In this Session, 09 Government Bills were introduced and 07 were passed. Some of the important Bills passed during the Session were:



During the First Session of the 17th Lok Sabha, 33 Bills were introduced and 35 were passed whereas the numbers were 18 and 14, respectively, during the Second Session. The Third Session witnessed introduction of 18 Bills and passage of 15 Bills. During the Fourth Session, 16 Bills were introduced and 25 Bills were passed whereas 17 Bills were introduced and 18 Bills were passed during the Fifth Session of the 17th Lok Sabha. 13 Bills were introduced, and as many as 20 Bills were passed, during the Sixth Session. During the Seventh Session of the 17th Lok Sabha, 12 bills were introduced and 09 were passed. The Eighth Session saw the

introduction of 12 Bills and 13 Bills were passed, whereas the Ninth Session saw the introduction of 06 Bills and passing of 07 Bills.



MATTERS UNDER RULE 377


Under Rule 377 of the Rules of Procedure and Conduct of Business in Lok Sabha, a Member who wishes to bring to the notice of the House a matter which is not a point of order, shall give notice in writing to the Secretary- General specifying clearly and precisely the text of the matter to be raised. The Member may be permitted to raise it only after the Speaker has given the consent and at such time and date as the Speaker may fix.

The Tenth Session of the 17th Lok Sabha saw 298 matters raised under Rule 377. Similarly during the Ninth Session, 319 matters were raised under Rule 377. During the First Session, 488 matters were raised whereas 365 matters were raised during the Second Session. The number of matter raised under Rule 377 during the Third Session was 414. During the Fourth Session, 183 matters were raised whereas 403 Matters were raised during the Fifth Session. Under Rule 377 a total number of 331, 383 and 486 matters were raised during the Sixth, Seventh and Eighth Session respectively of the Seventeenth Lok Sabha.




ZERO HOUR

The Tenth Session of the 17th Lok Sabha saw 374 Matters of Urgent Public Importance raised during Zero Hour. The First Session had as many as 1066 matters raised during Zero Hour; whereas 934 such matters were raised during the Second Session. During the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sessions, the number of matters raised during Zero Hour was 436, 370 and 583, respectively. Due to Covid-19 related regulations and restrictions on timing of the House, there was no Zero Hour during the Sixth Session of the 17th Lok Sabha. During the 7th Session, 563 Matters of Urgent Importance were raised during Zero Hour. The Eighth Session saw 696 Matters of Urgent Public Importance raised during Zero Hour, whereas the Ninth Session saw 98 matters raised.



REPORTS AND STATEMENTS

During the Tenth Session, the different Department Related Parliamentary Standing Committees (DRSCs) presented a total of 36 Reports. No report was presented by DRSCs during the First Session of the 17th Lok Sabha. During the Second Session, 50 Reports of were presented by DRSCs and 58 Reports were presented in the Third Session. While 2 Reports were presented in the Fourth Session, 156 Reports were presented by DRSCs during the Fifth Session of the 17th Lok Sabha. Similarly during the 6th Session and Seventh Sessions of the 17th Lok Sabha, 34 and 44 Reports, respectively, were presented to the House by the DRSCs. 63 Reports were presented by DRSCs during the 8th Session while 41 Reports were presented during the Ninth Session.




QUESTIONS

During the Tenth Session of the 17th Lok Sabha, out of 240 Starred Questions that were taken up during the Session, 56 Starred Questions were orally answered. The written replies to remaining Starred Questions, along with 2760 Unstarred Questions, were laid on the Table of the House.



During the First Session of the 17th Lok Sabha, out of 500 Starred Questions that were taken up during the Session, 183 Starred Questions were orally answered. 380 Starred Questions were admitted in the Second Session and out of that 140 Starred


Questions were orally answered. In the Third Session, out of 419 Starred Questions that were taken up during the Session, 98 Starred Questions were orally. There was no Question Hour during the Fourth Session of the 17th Lok Sabha. The figures were 440 and 84 during the Fifth Session of the 17th Lok Sabha. For the Sixth Session 320 Starred Questions were taken up and 66 Starred Questions were orally answered. Similarly, the figures were 340 and 91 during the Seventh Session of the 17th Lok Sabha. The Eighth Session saw 500 starred questions admitted and 182 answered orally whereas the figure for the Ninth Session was 320 admitted and 43 answered.



Answers to 2760 Unstarred Questions were Laid on the Table of the House in the Tenth Session. During the First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Sessions, answers of 5711, 4369, 4823, 2300 and 5057 Unstarred Questions, respectively, were Laid on the Table of the House. Similarly, answers to 3680 and 3910 Unstarred Questions were Laid on the Table of the House during the Sixth and Seventh Sessions of the 17th Lok Sabha. The Eighth Session saw 5750 answers to unstarred questions and the Ninth Session witnessed the laying of 3680 unstarred questions.
